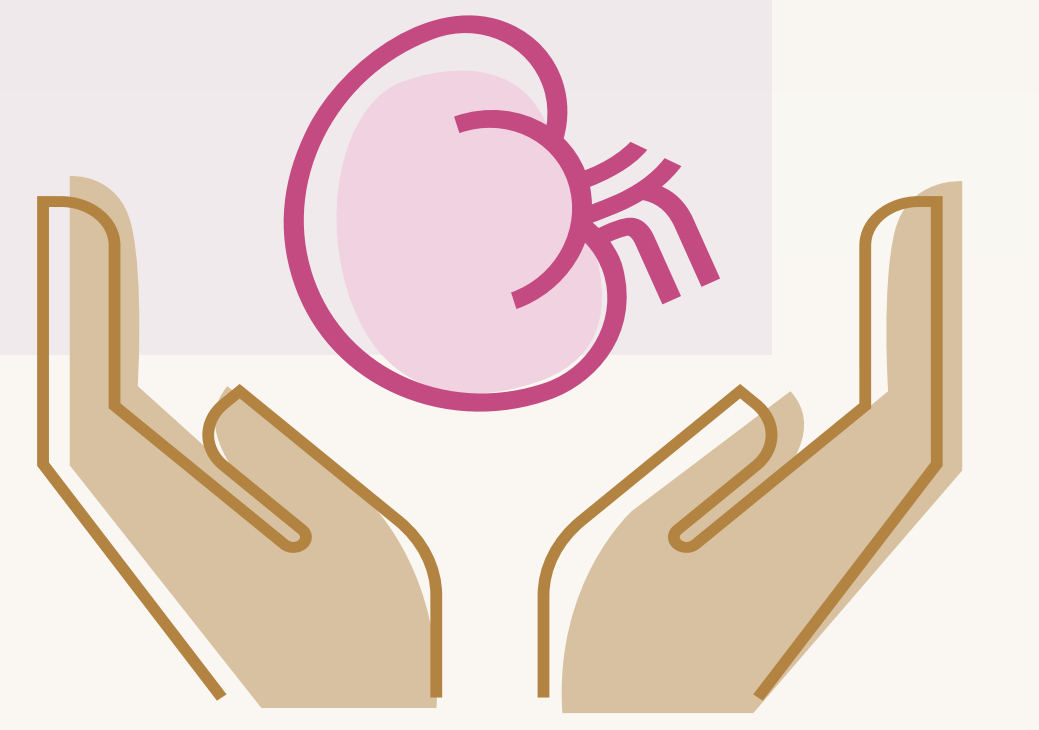


# Disparities in Kidney Transplantation

In 2018,

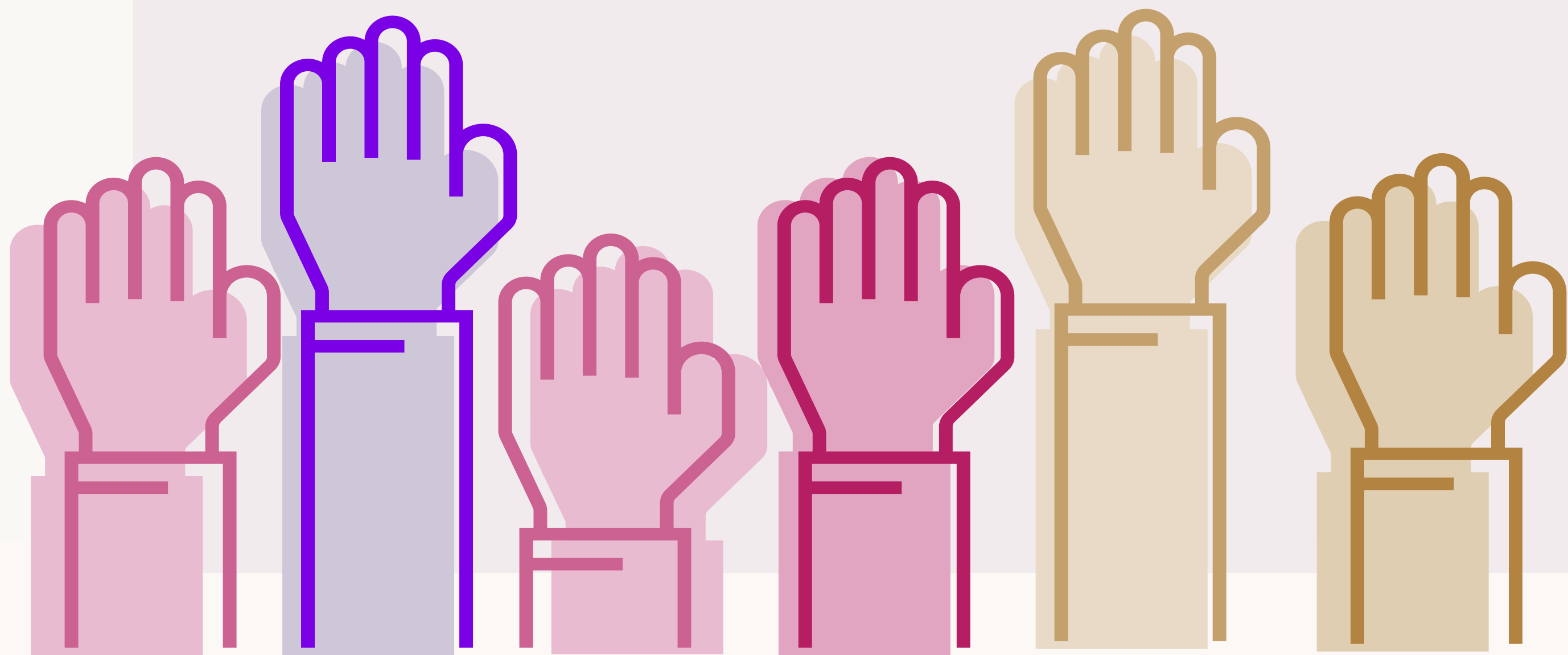


Despite this, White patients were **twice as likely** to be added to the waitlist<sup>1</sup>

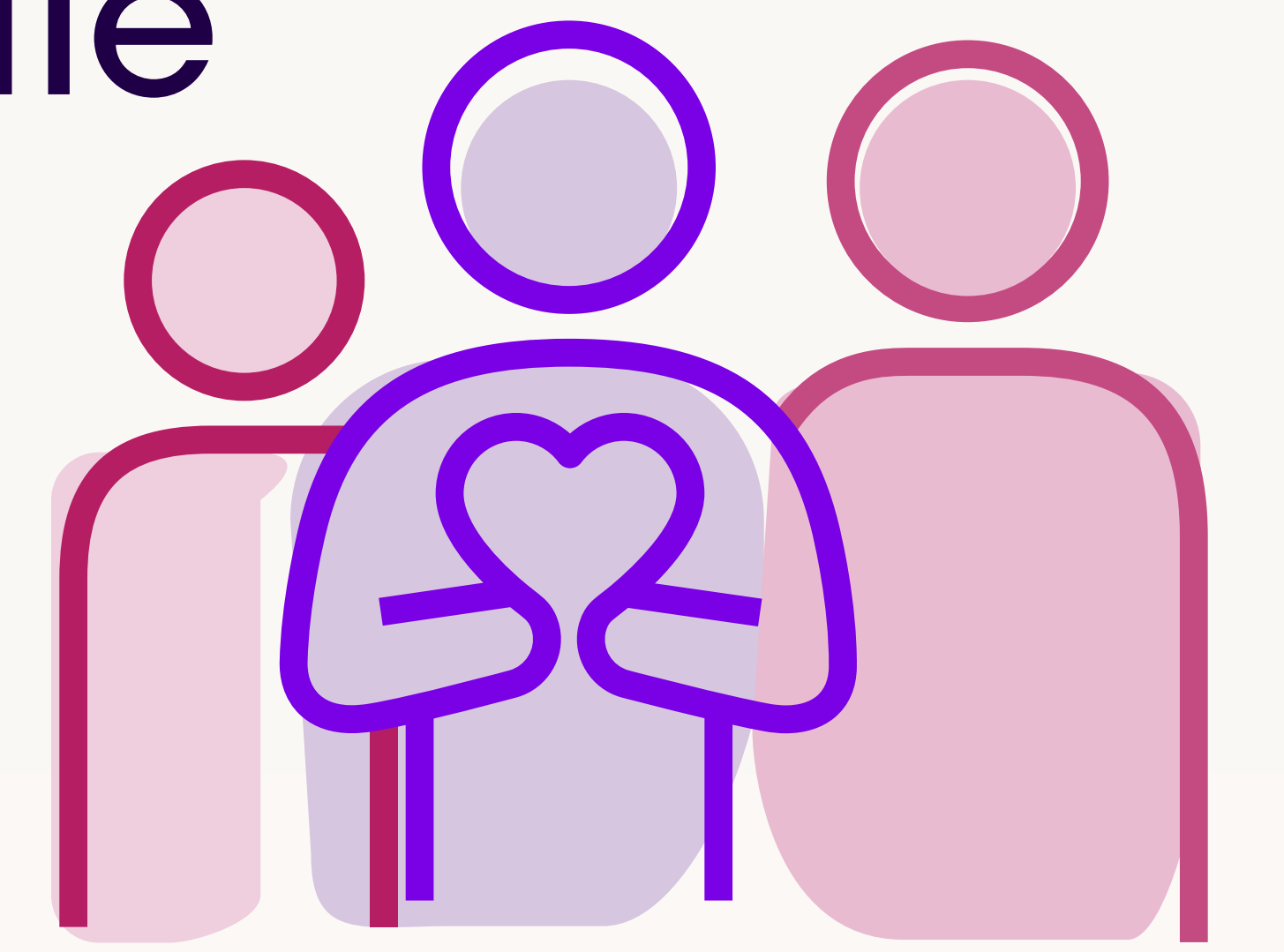


In 2019,

**66%** of all patients on the kidney transplant waitlist were **non-White**<sup>2</sup>



>> Underrepresented minorities were **less likely** to receive a transplant vs White patients despite **greater ESRD prevalence**<sup>1</sup>

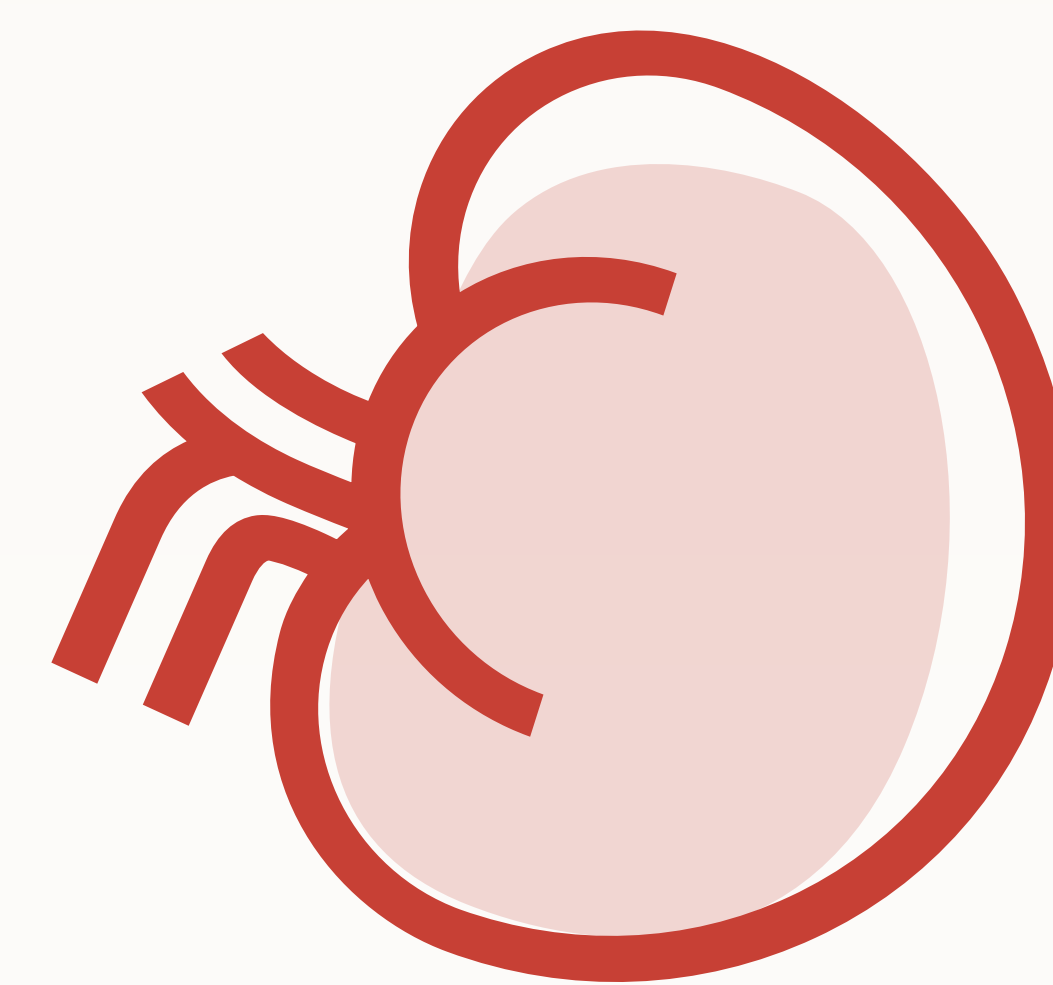


In 2020,

**although DDKT rates were equivalent** among non-White and White recipients, **LDKT rates differed** by race/ethnicity<sup>3</sup>



Black recipients were **~6X** **less likely** to receive a LDKT



Hispanic recipients were **~4X** **less likely** to receive a LDKT
